



EXOTIC VACATION

Traveling to New
Zealand might
mean a nearly daylong flight, but
upon arrival,
you're never far
from variegated
rain forest, glacial
mountains, geo-

thermal geysers, breathtaking fjords, or crystal-clear rivers and lakes brimming with giant trout. When you're ready to unwind, toast with pinot noir or sauvignon blanc from one of New Zealand's 600 wineries, or soak up indigenous Maori culture (the tribe has inhabited the island for at least 700 years).

Best way to begin: Auckland—New Zealand's largest city at 1.4 million—is accentuated by 50 dormant volcanoes, surrounded by 50 islands, and snug between two harbors. Known as the City of

Sails, Auckland boasts more boats per capita than anywhere in the world. Take to the water with award-winning Explore NZ and its America's Cup Sailing Experience in Waitemata Harbour. Crew on sleek racing machines—no experience necessary—or let someone else do the work as you pass must-see city scenes, including the Sky Tower, Mount Eden, Mission Bay, and the Harbour Bridge.

Best outdoor experience: Sea kayaking awaits in the South Island's Abel Tasman National Park and its turquoise Tasman Bay. A guided tour with Abel Tasman Kayaks invites a chance to observe the island's seal population. The nearby Abel Tasman Track is one of New Zealand's nine famous "great walks." Hike a few hours or conquer the entire 24 miles in five days with local expert guides, Wilson's. You'll pass protected estuaries, lagoons, and golden beaches. —Stephanie Stephens
